gave it to (1) Arjuna: Two accounts: (i) Arjuna desired to have Siva's Pāsupata missile so that he could burn the Danavas, the Rāksasas, the Bhūtas, the Pisacas, the Gandharvas and the mythical serpents (pannagas) in battle; he could then be a match for Bhīsma, Drona, Krpa, and Karna 3. 41. 7, 9, 11; Arjuna called it Brahmasiras which was terrific and of fierce power (yat tad brahmasiro nāma raudram bhimaparākramam) 3. 41. 8; Siva ready to give Pāsupata, his dear weapon (dayitam astram). to Arjuna as he was capable of possessing (dharana), releasing (moksa), and withdrawing (samhāra) it 3. 41. 13; to receive it, Arjuna purified himself and remained fully attentive (sucir bhutva samahitah); he folded his hands and said to Siva 'recite (the mantra)' (adhīṣva); Śiva then taught it to Arjuna together with its secrets and mode of withdrawal (sarahasyanivartanam) 3.41. 17-18; the missile, like the God of Death in bodily form, then waited on Arjuna; at that time the earth trembled and there was a loud sound of conches, drums and bheris by thousands; the gods and demons saw the missile in bodily form standing near Arjuna 3. 41. 17-22; 1. 1. 109; 3. 163. 48, 51; 6.116. 38; 8. 57. 44; (ii) During the night, after Arjuna took the vow to kill Jayadratha the next day before sunset, Kṛṣṇa advised Arjuna to acquire the knowledge of the great Pāśupata missile from Siva in order to be able to accomplish his vow: Krsna advised Ariuna to mentally approach god Siva; Arjuna touched water (samsprsyambhah), sat down on the ground, and mentally went to Bhava (Siva) 7. 57, 17-19; Arjuna praised Siva and made him favourable to give the missile 7. 57. 59; Siva told Arjuna and Krsna that

nearby there was a lake of nectar where he had left his divine bow and arrow; he asked them to get his bow and arrow 7. 57. 64-65; when they brought the bow and arrow. a Brahmacarin came from the side of Siva; he held the bow and, putting the arrow on it, drew it according the prescriptions (vyakarsac cāpi vidhivat sasaram dhanur uttamam 7. 57. 75); having seen how the Brahmacarin held the bow in his grip, how he drew the string, and the posture adopted by him (tasya maurvim ca mustim ca sthānam cālaksya pāndavah 7.57.76), and having heard the mantra recited by Siva, Arjuna understood the way how to employ Pasupata: the arrow was shot by the Brahmacarin in the lake and the bow was again placed in it; Arjuna then remembered the boon Siva granted to him during his stay in the forest (āranyaka) and his meeting Siva, and wished that he might now receive the boon; knowing Ariuna's mind. Siva gave him the boon, the Pāsupata missile, and wished him success in accomplishing his vow; Kṛṣṇa and Arjuna bowed down to Siva and, when permitted to leave, delighted they returned to their camp, 7. 57. 73-81; (Siva gave missile to Arjuna 7. 173. 100); (2) Besides Arjuna, Krsna knew the use of Pasupata 7. 57. 79; 8. 57. 44; Bhīsma is not so sure about Krsna's knowledge of the Pasupata 6. 116. 39. D. Effects: The missile, when released, produced thousands of tridents (\$\vec{\vec{vulas}}\$), fierce maces (gadāś cograpradarśanāh), and charmed arrows having the form of serpents (sarās cāsīvisākārāh sambhavanty anumantritāh) 3.41.10. E. Restrictions on its use: Arjuna was specifically told by Siva that the missile was never to be used against men (na prayojyam bhaved etan
