Aupara, 'descendant of Upara,' is the patronymic of Danda in the Taittirīya Samhitā (vi. 2, 9, 4).

Aupa-veśi, 'descendant of Upaveśa,' is the patronymic borne by Aruna, father of Uddālaka.<sup>1</sup>

Aupasvatī-putra, 'son of a female descendant of Upasvant' (?), is mentioned as a pupil of Pārāśarīputra in a Vaṃśa (list of teachers) of the Bṛhadāraṇyaka Upaniṣad.¹

Aupāvi ('descendant of Upāva') Jāna-śruteya ('descendant of Janasruti'), appears in the Śatapatha Brāhmaṇa¹ and the Maitrāyaṇī Saṃhitā² as a sacrificer who used to offer the Vājapeya sacrifice and ascend to the other world.

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Aupoditi, 'descendant of Upodita,' is the patronymic applied in the Taittirīya Samhitā¹ to Tumiñja, and in the Baudhāyana Śrauta Sūtra² to Gaupālāyana, son of Vyāghrapad, Sthapati ('general') of the Kurus. In the form of Aupoditeya, a metronymic from Upoditā, the name is found in the Śatapatha Brāhmaṇa,³ where the Kāṇva text calls him Tumiñja Aupoditeya Vaiyāghrapadya.

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Aurņa-vābha, 'descendant of Ūrnavābhi.' (1) This is the name of a pupil of Kauṇḍinya mentioned in a Vamśa (list of teachers) of the Brhadāranyaka Upaniṣad.¹ (2) A teacher of this name is frequently referred to in the Nirukta. His explanations in two passages² agree with those of the Nairuktas
